

My husband, Jeff, is very supportive of my hobby and I thank the Good Lord every day that I encouraged him to buy a hot rod as he can't very well complain if I decide I need a new sewing machine or two, or three! I look forward to continuing my fabric obsession and making new quilts and friends along the way.



Carol Gobrogge: My first experience with sewing involved making dresses and skirts when I was in elementary school on a featherweight my mom bought for \$25. I thought it was so fun to have my own account at the Loom Fabric Store in Belmont Shore, allowing me to go in and pick out fabric at 25 cents per yard. By now I can do pretty much much everything with a needle. I knit, (I took lessons from Roger Wagner's sister in Wrightwood.) crochet, embroider,

cross stitch and do crewel work. I made garments and costumes for my 4 kids. When they went off to college, I started quilting. I took my first classes at Leah's in Mission Viejo, and the fabric hoarding began soon after. I store my supplies in my shower and my fabric on a rolling rack in my garage. Besides quilts, I also enjoy making purses and bags. If only I could still get the fabric for 25 cents!

multiple quilts for friends and family. I love trying new techniques and making large

quilts. Until about four years ago, I quilted all my quilts by hand. Now I enjoy quilting on my domestic machine as well. My other loves include spending time with my nine grandchildren, gardening, and reading.



Secretary, Vivien Hawker: I love quilting and being part of our fabulous guild. I love hiking and camping with my family and furry friends. Wait til you see how easy it is! The finished quilt is 33" square.



- · You must use the equivalent of a 4x4 inch piece of one challenge fabric of your choice and a 2x2 inch piece of each of the remaining challenge fabrics, visible on the front of your entry excluding the binding.
- · You may add as many other fabrics and/or embellishments to your entry as you wish.
- · The "Sweet" charm included in the kit must be sewn on the front of your entry.
- · Original designs are not a requirement.

All entries must have a label on the back with the title of the entry and the name of the maker.

- · Sleeves are not required as quilts will be pinned for display.
- · Submission of the challenge entry gives permission for the entry to be photographed and for that photograph to be included in the newsletter and/or other medium.

Ribbons will be awarded for such categories as:

- Best Interpretation of the Theme
 - · Best Original Design
 - Best Use of a Traditional block
 - Best Non-quilt Entry
 - Best Use of Challenge Fabrics

Vickie Janis Doo Dah Daisy



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
