# February Program Jane Haworth

I started making art quilts after my first trip to Kauai. I came back inspired with colorful images in my head and in photographs that I needed to recreate in fabric.

I have been involved with fabric all my life. My grandmother taught me to sew. At 18, I went to college in Carlisle, England and studied Textile Design majoring in weaving. My first real job was working for Laura Ashley in Wales. The best part of

that job was the amazing sales on their fabrics. My stash had started!

I moved to Auburn, California from England in 1998, with my husband and two daughters. I have entered my quilts in quite a few competitions. My first ever entry won first place for novice quilter at the Nevada County Fair and I won a sewing machine. In 2005, my "Ocean Life at Bali Hai" quilt was accepted into the International Quilt Show at Paducah and more recently was displayed at the Pacific International Quilt Festival. My "Tribute to Charley Harper" has been shown at Sisters, Oregon in 2009, and the IQA Fall Show 2009 in Houston.

My biggest love in quilting is color and fabric. Kaffe Fassett has been a big influence. I heard him speak at college in 1984 and spent years knitting his sweater patterns.

The technique I use on my quilts is mostly raw-edge collage appliqué. This allows me to cut, layer and then glue the fabrics before machine quilting them. Influences for my quilts come from many places. I use photos of landscapes, sea-life, birds and the work of illustrator Charley Harper. https://www.charleyharperartstudio.com/

#### **Quilts and Memories**

When **Elizabeth Geer**, Bus Trips Co-Chair, took the funds collected over to our treasurer, **Jeanette Brooks**, she saw one of my quilts hanging on the wall (photo on left).

"Missing a Piece" is old, constructed between October 2001 and May 2004 and is based on a pattern, "Another Day in Paradise," by **Cindy Cooksey.** The pattern was purchased at Fabric Boutique in Las Vegas during one of my monthly business trips. Hand appliquéd, it was a "carry

along" project started in October 2001 in Baja during a surf trip to San Juanico.

The quilt is composed of nine Volkswagen buses. All nine blocks were sewn together by September 2002 and then embellishing began with characters from a collection of conversation prints. There were buses of surfers, mambo singers, a wild life version with bears, and another with space aliens among other craziness.

It was machine quilted to resemble puzzle pieces. Painting the puzzle pieces for some reason seemed like a good idea—so some of them are metallic colors. It's a mystery why that happened but I did have a sore throat at the time so maybe it was the cold medicine (funny, what one remembers). Then, a "brilliant" idea occurred: one of the pieces should be missing—a piece was cut out of the finished quilt. Yikes!

When her boys were young, Jeanette drove a series of much-loved Volkswagen buses (and has a vivid tale of driving one back through the storm winds of Palm Springs when she was about nine months pregnant). It seemed fitting that she should own the quilt. It has hung on her wall for about 17 years.

Anyway, Elizabeth emailed in late December and asked if I'd recreate one of the blocks as a mini-quilt for a bus trip door prize. I wondered if I still had the pattern.

What to do this time? I settled on a bus load of quirky quilters headed to Road to California led by Elizabeth who, of course, is leading the singing. The sky is cloudy and the road is wet but no matter, we are headed to a QUILT SHOW!

And so it goes...what memories are associated with your quilts?

**Show and Tell January 2023** 



Del Thomas Wedding Ring

Made in approx. 1948 with grandmother's quilting group at the Grange in Clackamas, OR. I did some stitching and threaded needles. The ladies gave me the quilt and I have used it almost to a rag. Fabrics from 1920's forward.



#### Charlotte Runyan Grandmother's Flower Garden

My first quilt was this
Grandmother's Flower Garden.
I wanted a project to take to
college. My mother
remembered a flower garden
quilt that her grandmother had
made. She didn't really know
how to do English paper
piecing. I just sewed each
hexagon scrap to the next one.
I have over 60 flowers, but
never put them together.



Charlotte Runyan Lone Star

This Lone Star was my first quilt that was completed about 1977.



Charlotte Runyan Birthday Flower

The fabric selection was terrible! I used many cotton/poly blends. I pieced this one on the machine and hand quilted it. My ex-husband tried to take this one with him when he left in 1979. I should have given it to him!



I made this quilt for my 70th birthday in October. I copied a quilt that I had seen on the wall at Roxanne's quilt shop in Carpenteria. When I later returned it wasn't there. My friend had taken a picture and with the help of the sales girl we chose fabrics similar to the original. The tablecloth is made of strips pieced together. The background is quilted before the flowers are appliquéd. The flowers are a Kaffe fabric. Each one is cut and raw edge appliquéd and quilted around.



#### Mary Arter Koi Pond

This is a 2-fabric appliqué kit from Pacific Rim Quilting. I didn't like any of the quilting I did in the open spaces, so I just outline quilted all the shapes.



#### Mary Arter Moana Loa

I made this for the Abstract issue of Curated Quilts - Mini Quilt Challenge.
It will be in the April issue.
This quilt was inspired by the lava flows and resulting hardscape from the eruption of Moana Loa volcano that began on Nov. 27, 2022. The improv piecing uses almost all curved shapes.
The quilting was done in parallel, lightly curving lines in a yellow variegated thread.



#### Jan Hirth Kisses in the Gloom

Made using Jen Kingwell's pattern called, "Love Letters." Her kisses are in the border and the gloom is the gray background. The rays of sunshine and turquoise sky are from Hoffman's batiks I purchased on a tour. Vivien Hawker did the machine quilting.



#### Odette Osantowski First Quilt

My first quilt made after retiring. I used "Learn How to Quilt." I did everything wrong...no walking foot, no quilting foot, and I didn't know how to do the binding.



#### Jan Hirth The Old Ohio Star

First quilt made in about 1970. It was made with rusts and beiges. The cotton batting is quite thick, so as I quilted I didn't go through to the back fabric. I didn't know how to bind a quilt, so I turned the back over the edges. This quilt faded in its place on the rust-colored recliner over the years.



#### Holly Betz Alpine Sampler

I took a sampler class in the early 1980's. The small quilt shop had limited choices but this fit with my childhood blue bedroom. It was a gift to my parents.

There's 1/4 inch echo quilting. Hand quilting back then was my favorite part of the process.

Hawaiian Applique
This is my first appliqué
project. It depicts Hawaiian
royalty.



Linda Waters Sampler

This sampler is from the Amidon shop in San Diego. I pieced it in 1994 using the Hoffman fabric of the year. I quilted it in 1999.



Sherry Smith 1930's Butterfly Quilt

My first larger quilt. I saw it displayed at Sewing Sisters Quilt Shop in Carlsbad around 2001. I had to make it. I loved the old-fashioned embroidery.



Sherri Peltier Textile Totems I saw these at the

Houston Quilt Show and thought I would like to make some.



#### Karen Wendel Sampler

At Piecemakers in Costa Mesa in the 1980's, they helped me pick out the fabrics. I wasn't fond of the pink. The top took forever to make from paper templates and using scissors...no rotary cutter then. All hand-appliquéd, hand pieced and hand quilted.

#### Claudia Redfern California Poppies

During COVID, I asked if the 18 ladies in my friendship group would like to do an exchange. I love Tina Curran's Poppy pattern. Eight ladies completed the exchange. Only two ladies have assembled all the blocks into a finished quilt.

#### Hiroko Moriwaki My Very First Quilt

My friend, Judy Yamezaki introduced me to Capistrano Adult School's quilt class in 1992. I remember I was so happy and excited to learn quilting. My very first quilt was a sampler quilt from the class taught by Suzanne Stanton. I enjoyed may more classes from Suzanne. I only hand quilted very little, so I haven't washed it yet.



#### Janice Tsuma My First Quilt

A Friendship quilt sewn with my daughters, sister and mother. It was inspired by an American Girl Doll story.





#### Nancy Ota First Real Quilt

I think of this as my first real quilt. It was made in my first quilt class with Suzanne Stanton when she taught at the SJC Adult Education, probably in 1988. Suzanne taught us the names of the blocks, how to draft and sew the blocks, how to appliqué, layer and quilt. Because it was my first quilt, I gave it to my husband. But Mike said, "It is nice, but you know I like blue." I told him he was a gardener, he should like green. He grew to like it and used it.


