My interest in making art quilts was jump-started by seeing my dear friend, Sara, take a variety of patterned fabrics, cut them into pieces and combine them in such an artistic way. As a life-long sewer (having experienced my first sewing triumph with a skating skirt I made in Girl Scouts), I took to quilting quickly. One of the great thrills with this art form is that my options are as infinite as those of a painter working on canvas -- landscapes, portraits, geometric patterns, abstract impressions, etc. I enjoy both the deep American roots of traditional quilting and the unlimited possibilities today's art quilts present.

Combining elements of both extremes is great fun, as I often use contemporary fabrics in century-old quilt patterns.

My art quilts have been on display in multiple art shows and quilt shows as well as in national quilt magazines ("Quilters Newsletter" magazine and "Quiltmaker") over 20 times and in three books (including Ricky Tims' "Kool Kaleidoscopes").

While I have no formal art training, I have taken some wonderful classes over the years. However I know my greatest learning has come in the over 10,000 hours I've spent making more than 125 art quilts to date. And it's exciting to realize that there seems to be no end to this learning curve.

# January Workshop At the Beach Tina Curran

Description: Inspired by the aerial photography of Gray Malin, this is my interpretation of a bird's eye-view of a beach, decorated with colorful towels and umbrellas. These quilts are made with regular piecing and some partial seams, plus invisible machine appliqué using monofilament thread. The umbrella/towel blocks finish at 6" square, and the finished quilt is 31" high by 39" wide. Make the whole quilt, or just a few blocks for a table runner. See the quilt in person at the December guild meeting.

Pattern: The required pattern is available from Tina's Etsy shop.

**BLOCK OF THE MONTH Holly Betz & Judy Kamman** 




#### 2022-2023



This is our final trip around the block. We are offering a "smorgasborder" of ideas to try. You have 4 1/2 inches to play with on this row. You could create a four patch design using any of the squares, triangles, or rectangle components from the previous borders. Add appliqué to your quilt using shapes to create vines or flowers choose your preferred method of appliqué – fusible, freezer paper, or needle-turn.

Your two side borders will measure 36 1/2 inches. The top and bottom borders will measure 44 1/2 inches. If you are using cornerstones you will have four borders each measuring 36 1/2 inches with 4 1/2 inch cornerstones Your completed top is now 44 ½"square.

Here are some combination block options...



#### Two different sizes -

1. One large 4 1/2" snowball.

Cut one 41/2" square Cut 4 1 1/2" squares Sew as directed.

2. Four Stacked snowballs.

Cut four 2 1/2 inch squares

Cut eight 3/4 " squares


Sew as directed. Sew the four small blocks into one 4 1/2" unit.


#### Economy block:


Cut one 2 1/2"center square

Cut two 2 ½"squares, cut each square in half diagonally Cut two 2 ¾"squares, cut each square in half diagonally

So together as shown below







Cut 4 1 1/2" squares of background fabric

Cut 4 1 1/2"x 2 1/2" rectangles of background fabric

Cut 8 1 1/2" squares for star points

Cut 12 1/2" square for the center

Make 4 flying geese units.


Sawtooth Star Block:


Place 1 1 1/2" Starpoint fabric square on a rectangle. Sew on diagonal and press open.

Sew the second square on the diagonal to complete one unit.

Sew one background square to each side of two flying geese units. Sew flying geese unit to each side of center square. Sew the three rows together to complete the block.

Diamond block
Cut one 4 ½"x 2 ½"rectangle
Cut two 2 ½" squares of background fabric
Sew as directed



It was a surprise to interview Susan and get to learn about her past achievements. Some of you who live in San Clemente may recognize Susan as your past Mayor and City Council member from 1998-2006. Though Susan originally entered the working world in commercial real estate, she really was drawn to politics, wanting to serve her community. Susan has worn many hats in the community through the years. In addition to her City Council and Planning Commission service, Susan served as a member of the OC **Transportation Board, the OC Fire** Authority, and the California League of Cities.



Susan was named San Clemente Citizen of the Year in 2008 after successfully chairing the fundraising campaign for the new Senior Center.

When circumstances called her to take care of her father at the end of his life, she realized that nurses who were caring and skilled played a big part in the comfort, safety and dignity of a patient and their family. It was after his death that she moved from politics to studying to be an RN at Concordia University. This career path had an unknown (at the time) blessing because later she was able to care for her brother in the last weeks of his life.

When her boys were young, she took some time off and began quilting. She made baby quilts for her two sons which led her into the quilting world. Like many of us she learned to sew as a child from her mother. Many years later when her mom was living at the San Clemente Villas, they were both doing some sewing in one of the common areas. Our dear Margo Grube (deceased) who also lived there at the time noticed Susan and her quilting skills and was the one to introduce Susan to our guild!

Susan continues to quilt, enjoying piecing and some machine appliqué using bright and bold colors. If she isn't nursing, sewing or spending time with her family, Susan has time for a pickleball game or two, or enjoying a good book.

#### **President's Quilt for Debbie Myers**

Let's show Debbie some love and thank her for her year as Surfside President by making an awesome quilt with the theme Fourth of July At the Beach! Make a quilt block that will remind her of this holiday on the sand and in the water. Your block can be pieced, appliqued, embroidered, colored, dyed—whatever you like.

Colors: Use a patriotic red/white/blue color palette or a bright color palette—Debbie loves bright colors. Use any background color that works with your color palette.

#### **Block Ideas:**

- 1--Fussy cut a design from a beach- or patriotic-themed fabric and appliqué to your background.
- 2—Make a pieced star block
- 3—Create an applique design
- 4—Embroider a design by machine or by hand
- 5—Make a pieced T-shirt block\* using patriotic or beach fabrics
- 6—Or whatever else you can think of—be creative!!
- \*T-shirt block pattern & instructions may be found on the Surfside Quilters Guild website: https://www.surfsidequiltersguild.org/presidents-quilt.html

You can add 3-D embellishments as long as they are within the 5" X 5" space and are sewn on securely. Keep in mind that everything will be quilted after assembly.

Block Size: Please make your block approximately 6" X 6" square, but keep your design within a 5" X 5" square area. The assembly team will trim the blocks to 5-1/2" square—we don't want to cut off any of your work!

Signature: Please remember to sign your name to your block, within the 5" X 5" space. I will have pens available at guild meetings for your use.

Schedule: I will collect blocks at the January, February, and March guild meetings. The final day to turn in your block is March 14—no exceptions, to allow the assembly committee time to do their work.
