Throughout her life, Cathie Hoover has done just about everything with fabric, including dressmaking, knitting with fabric, quilting, and quilted wearable art. She earned a B.S. degree in Home Economics from Chico State College in Chico, CA. She studied tailoring, pattern drafting,

and added a year of weaving to her knowledge of textiles.

Cathie's Specialties:


- All types of machine appliqué: fused and non-fused, either finished with satin stitching, blanket stitching, or soft-edge treatment.
- Reverse appliqué by machine finished with blanket stitch or decorative stitch. Her special method is refined and one that she finds more useful than any other appliqué method.
- Machine embellishments with decorative stitches, laces, braids, and especially rickrack.
 - The use of brilliant color and color combinations in all quilt making techniques.
 - Combining printed fabrics of all types and styles with each other while keeping the identity of each fabric visible and vibrant.

She was selected to be a Fairfield Fashion Show Designer four times (1993, 1994, 1995 1998) and a Bernina Fashion Show Designer five times (2002, 2003, 2005, 2006, 2008). Although she is thoroughly enraptured with quilting, quilted wearable art remains a passion. Since 1988, she has taught quilting workshops and given lectures at large and small quilting venues throughout California and much of the United States, including Hawaii.

ON BEING A NERD

It will officially be fall by the time you read this. While I might be expected to write about pumpkin spice lattes, trick-or-treating, or the coming holidays, that did not occur to me.

I have spent the last month—in which my upstairs regularly hit 88 degrees and it was too hot to sew—thinking about one thing. Should I use the dark background or the light background on my Prismatic Star Quilt?

To decide, I pinned two pieces of fabric to my "design wall," the king-size white flannel sheet that I have attached to one wall with push pins. One is a dark fabric with green and black stripes; the other an off white fabric with a black print that resembles postcards. On top, I carefully arranged and pinned the pieces of the stars.

I stepped back, took a few photos, tweaked the design a bit, and there it has remained. I've checked "my design wall" in the morning, padding in bare feet on the way to make coffee. I've squinted at it at noon and even gazed at it in the dark while brushing my teeth to go to bed.

Strangely enough, this struggle to decide and the tweaking that goes on, is my favorite part of quilting. It's the process that intrigues me, not the finished product.



Definitely the behavior of a NERD, you think? Fortunately, there are people who understand this strange behavior and have even more exotic rituals of their own. I guess that's why I enjoy Member Showcases and Show & Tell at our guild meetings so much.

It's always wonderful and actually overwhelming to see the blockbuster quilts at shows like Long Beach. But, frankly, it's more heart-warming to see the work of our own members and get to know them a bit better through their quilts.

I'm so GLAD to be a member of Surfside Quilters Guild. Thank you all for making me feel a bit less nerdy.

As we continue to ROCK THE BLOCK...

Border number two is SQUARES...

You can make a checkerboard 4 patch and mini 4 patch, seminole, skewed nine patch, or square in a square.

Each border will be 4 1/2" x 20 1/2" unfinished.

There will be four cornerstones measuring 4 1/2 x 4 1/2" unfinished Now your quilt will measure 28 1/2 x 28 1/2 unfinished.



Four- Patches

A speedy way to make batches of four patches is to use the strip set technique. Instead of cutting individual squares for your four patch cut light and dark strips WOF 2 ½ inches wide. Sew together the light and dark inch strips using a quarter inch seam along the edge of the strip, press towards the dark side sub cut the strips into pieces 2 ½ inches. Sew together to make your 4 patch.

You will need a total of 24 patches for the checkerboard...five for each side and seven for the top and bottom rows.

To make a mini four patch, two strips will be cut 1 ½ inch light and dark strips and follow the directions given above.

To make the mini 4 patch you will need 2 1/2 inch mini squares added to 2 1/2 inch solid fabric squares.

Seminole

Basic Seminole instructions are included. From the book written by.. Cheryl Greider Bradkin

The strips for your strip set need to measure 4 1/2 inches unfinished. Please cut light and dark strips of a suggested 3 inch, 2 inch, and 3 inch widths. Cut into 2 1/2 inch units and then assemble.

Skewed Nine Patch


Cut strips each 2 inches and assemble as a traditional nine patch. A template to make your skewed nine patch is provided to you. A total of 24 blocks will be required... five on each side and seven on the top and bottom to form your border.

Square in Square

To make one block cut a center square 3 3/8 inches. Cut two corner squares 3 3/8 inches. Cut the corner squares once on the diagonal. Fold your center square and make creases across the middle in both directions. Place one corner triangle on top aligning the point of the triangle with a crease. Retreat for the opposite side of the square. Press open and then add the other two opposite sides. Press flat and trim to 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ inches. A total of 24 blocks would be required. Five on each side and seven on the top and bottom to form your borders.

They could be used individually as cornerstones.

Ed. Note: The Skewed Nine Patch may not be accurate for size when printed. Double check the measurements and re-draw if necessary.





Plastic templates for the Skewed Nine Patch in 4 sizes (2.5," 3," 4," 5") are still available for purchase.

The templates were originally designed by Kris Kouzelos and are being sold by Lyn Mann.

At our General Meeting in Sept we made \$81 on Fabric Sales.


We sold quilt tops for \$60 and \$120 in the Silent Auction. Thanks for the donations!


