**Lullabies in Cloth**

Join Helen Frost and Deborah Gordon as they trace the history of cradle and crib quilts. By sharing quilts from their collections, they will show how baby quilts have changed through the years. As quilts changed, so did the attitudes toward children and their care. With excerpts from women's diaries, journals, and historical records, you will hear bittersweet stories and memories of what childbirth and child-rearing was like in the past. This entertaining, touching, and humorous lecture will give you a new appreciation for the makers of these small, sweet quilts – lullabies in cloth.



Helen Frost is a familiar name to quilters, especially those that have been quilting for more than 20 years. She is the author of several quilt books, some co-authored with her mother Blanche Young. Their newest is *All-Star Quilts: 10 Strip-Pieced Lone Star Sparklers*. Although known for her innovative strip-piecing techniques, her first love is hand appliqué. In 2009 Helen was inducted into the Arizona Quilters Hall of Fame. She made and donated the 2013 raffle quilt for the International Quilt Association which required more than 500 hours of hand quilting. Deborah Gordon was taught to sew at an early age by her great-grandmother and great aunt, and became an accomplished needle-woman. She has taught needle-point, embroidery, and quilting at the community college level for more than 30 years. Specializing in traditional designs, Debbie brings new life to old patterns with different arrangements and inventive color and fabric choices. She has received the honor of being named one of California's Living Treasures. Author of two books, Debbie continues to teach and lecture, encouraging women each day. She lives in Orange, California.





Summer is passing us by again and we are looking forward to all the celebrations that come during the last quarter of the year.







Have you ever talked with someone and then realized you were smiling the whole time? Well, spend a few minutes speaking with Irmgard Terbrack and you will feel yourself smiling.

Irmgard's positive attitude is apparent not only in her conversation, but also with her activities. A member of both Beach Cities Quilters Guild and Surfside Quilters Guild, Irmgard participates in as many of the workshops as possible. She very much enjoys the workshops, and says that although she may have learned a skill previously, it is good to try something again, as well as get a new twist on the technique.

She first started quilting in 2002, after her retirement from Disney. She worked there for many years as a costumer. She states that she had fun at work, and went to work to play! (Again, that positive attitude!) Irmgard now sews costumes for her three great-nieces and wedding dresses for pleasure.

As for quilting, she prefers making smaller quilted pieces so she can experience the feeling of accomplishment. Her "current" favorite technique is fusible appliqué. However, she has recently taken on a "huge" quilt—just so she can say she made a huge quilt! Irmgard also enjoys working on her quilts in her Friendship Group, "Around the Block" with leader Betty Prottas.

Irmgard meets people in her Friendship Group and then delights in attending the guilds to meet up with them again. She also loves making new friends at the monthly meetings. She likes that our guild is a smaller group which allows her to meet almost everyone.



As part of Leah Zieber's program on historical quilts, Candy Martin showed this quilt which she found at a church picnic. It is hand appliquéed and hand quilted.

This pattern is Princess Feather (originally "Prince's Feather" after the Prince of Wales insignia). The pattern was popular in the Pennsylvania area in the mid 1800's. The red fabric was worn away and Candy has been working to replace it. Green dye was famously fugitive in this era - which shows in the mottled values in the green feathers.

A Princess Feather quilt is part of the collection at the Philadelphia Museum of Art.

 "Two roads diverged in a wood, and I - I took the one less traveled by, And that has made all the difference."





Mary McKinney made this quilt from a Fons & Porter magazine pattern. It is for her great-grandbaby - she hopes!






"Just Between Friends" by Sharon Pembrook

On July 20th, Heather gave birth to her first daughter and our first grandchild, who they named Elizabeth Rose. Lyn made this quilt as a gift to our new little one."






Maggie Bell showed a quilt that belongs to her sister Barbara Nunnelley. It was made by their great-grandmother before 1936 (the year she died). It is mostly hand sewn. 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


This is a wounded warrior, en route to hospital or home, holding a shipping box containing his quilt. The paper on top is what Mary Freedman talks about in her article on page 9.
